SUBSTANCE ABUSE WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW AND WHERE TO FIND OUT!

The purpose of these policies is to clearly communicate the concern of the University regarding:

1. *The health and safety of its employees and students,*
2. *The desire for an efficient and effective work force and educational environment and to comply with all federal, state, and local regulations regarding substance abuse in the workplace.*

The University has a responsibility to educate and promote healthy, low risk choices within our student population and to support similar policies within the aviation and aerospace industry.

Due to our cooperative relationship with the aviation and aerospace industry, the University intends to be clear in its position regarding the use, possession, and/or sale of illicit drugs, and towards those who have knowledge of violations of any federal, state and local laws. Additionally, the University will take serious action regarding the abuse of legal substances or the illegal sale of legal substances.

The University intends to comply with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1988, the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989, Department of Transportation regulations and all Federal Aviation Administration regulations regarding drug and alcohol abuse. Students who enroll at the University should plan to adopt a healthy (substance free) lifestyle.

UNIVERSITY POLICIES AND SANCTIONS

The University prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, possession, sale and use of illegal drugs, designer and synthetic drugs, prohibited drugs and drug related paraphernalia on

University property and/or while attending a business or academic activity, a student organization/athletic activity or trip, while on duty or while operating a vehicle or machine leased or owned by the University. Students found responsible for violating this policy can expect a minimum sanction of suspension from the University.

Knowledge of or being in the presence of the manufacture, use, possession or sale of illegal drugs, designer and synthetic drugs, prohibited drugs and drug related paraphernalia constitutes equal responsibility and involvement in the incident. Students found responsible for violating this policy can expect sanctions up to and including suspension from the University.

Students who are found responsible for violating the drug policy may be sanctioned to required drug testing. A positive finding of a drug test will constitute evidence of drug use and those students should expect a minimum sanction of suspension from the University.

- *Parental Notification: The University, in its sole discretion, may notify parents and or guardians/sponsors regarding students in violation of campus alcohol and drug policies without the student's consent.*

It is not the intention of ERAU to intrude into students' lives. However, individuals should be aware that ERAU does not condone the abuse of alcohol or the use of illegal drugs, even when an individual is not on the University premises. Any person convicted for the use, possession or sale of illegal drugs on or off the University premises may expect to face University judicial action.

STUDENTS

Knowledge of or being in the presence of the manufacture, use, possession or sale of narcotics, marijuana, steroids, sedatives,

tranquilizers, drug paraphernalia or other paraphernalia used to facilitate illegal use of a legal substance, stimulants, hallucinogens, or other similar non-prescription agents known to be harmful or habit forming drugs or chemicals, and attempting to manufacture or sell counterfeit drugs is strictly prohibited both on and off campus. Having knowledge of or being present when a violation occurs constitutes equal responsibility and involvement in the incident. Any student involved in the above described activities may be suspended from the University.

ALCOHOL

Embry-Riddle's policy on the use of alcoholic beverages is in accordance with the Florida State Law. Students must be at least 21 years of age to purchase, possess or consume alcoholic beverages.

Students who choose to drink retain responsibility for their behavior and conduct on and off campus. Use of alcohol on University property, with the exception of designated approved areas or events, or illegal use or misuse of alcohol on University property is prohibited. If found responsible for a violation of this policy, the minimum sanction you may expect to receive is a disciplinary warning; however, depending on the nature and seriousness of the violation, the sanctions could range up to and include suspension from the University.

Alcohol consumption causes a number of marked changes in behavior. Even low doses significantly impair the judgment and coordination required to drive a car safely, increasing the likelihood that the driver will be involved in an accident. Low to moderate doses of alcohol also increase the incidence of a variety of aggressive acts, including spouse and child abuse. Moderate to high doses of alcohol cause marked impairments in higher mental functions, severely altering a person's ability to learn and remember information. Very high doses cause respiratory depression and possible death. If combined with other depressants of the nervous system, much lower doses of alcohol will produce the effects just listed.

Repeated use of alcohol can lead to dependency. Sudden cessation of alcohol intake is likely to produce withdrawal symptoms, including severe anxiety, tremors, hallucinations, and convulsions. Alcohol withdrawal can be life threatening. Long term consumption of large quantities of alcohol, particularly when combined with poor nutrition, can also lead to permanent damage to vital organs such as the brain and liver.

Mothers who drink alcohol during pregnancy may give birth to infants with Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. These infants have irreversible physical abnormalities and mental retardation. In addition, research indicates that children of alcoholic parents have greater risk than others for becoming alcoholics.

*ADDENDUM FOR FLIGHT STUDENTS:

1st Offense:

- Must see University Physician within 1 week (Dr. Waikins)
- Student will be grounded for 3 months from all flight activity
- Must see Flight Dept. Chair within 2 weeks (Dr. Theokas)

2nd Offense:

- Must see University Physician within 1 week (Dr. Waikins)
- Student will be grounded for 6 months from all flight activity
- Must see Flight Dept. Chair within 2 weeks (Dr. Theokas)

3rd Offense:

- Meet with Dr. Theokas
- Expect suspension from flight program
- Potential suspension from university

Flight students are required to notify the Chairman of the Flight Department of all DUI charges. It is therefore the policy of the Flight Training Department to take the following actions when any flight student, regardless of where they live, is arrested for a DUI.

1. Suspend the student from the flight program until the court determines the student's guilt or innocence.
 - a. Upon acquittal by the court or its acceptance of a plea to a lesser offense, the student may be returned to active status in the flight program.
 - b. If the court convicts the student of the DUI, the student may be dismissed permanently from the University's flight education program.
2. Regardless of the student's guilt or innocence and prior to

reinstatement into the flight education program, the student must meet with the MEdical Director of Student Health Services who will determine the student's need for further alcohol and substance evaluation and treatment.

3. If the Medical Examiner determines there is no reason to suspend the student from flight status based on the alcohol evaluation, the student will meet with the Chairman of the Flight Training Department. The Chairman will review the student's flight history and determine the student's suitability for continuing in the flight program at the appropriate time.
4. If a student is returned to active flight status after a DUI conviction and is subsequently convicted of another DUI, the student will be removed permanently from the flight education and Aeronautical Science degree programs. The Chairman of the Flight Training Department will recommend the student be subject to the Student Judicial Review process (or, will recommend dismissal from the University).

**Disciplinary system is cumulation, the more a student violates, the harsher the sanction.

DRUG TESTING

The mandatory Student Drug Testing Program applies to all students whose catalog applicability is 1990-91 and later, and who engage in flight training at Embry-Riddle on or after January 1, 1991. Students who have a catalog applicability prior to the 1990-91 academic year and who engage in flight training at Embry-Riddle have the option of participating in the random testing program.

Embry-Riddle will test for the following drugs as outlined by the Department of Transportation (D.O.T.): marijuana, cocaine, opiates, amphetamines, phencyclidine (PCP).

The University will provide the following types of drug testing:

- Random Testing of students engaged in flight training.
- Post-Accident Testing will be required for any student who is involved in an aircraft accident. The student will be tested for drugs within 32 hours after an accident. An accident is an occurrence associated with the operation of an aircraft which takes place between the time any person boards the aircraft with the intention of flight and the time all such persons(s) have disembarked, and in which any person suffers death or serious injury, or in which the aircraft received substantial damage as determined by the National Transportation Safety Board.
- Pre-employment Testing will be required for any student who applies to work in a safety sensitive student assistant position here at the University.

Actions to be taken for positive test results, refusal to be tested, or failure to comply with testing procedures:

- Students whose test results show positive for the use of an illegal or non-prescribed drug, as verified by a Medical Review Officer, will be suspended from the University.

- Refusal to be tested when requested by the University will result in the student being suspended from the University.
- When testing is required, the student will comply with all directives of the University concerning the place of testing, the manner in which the student is to arrive at the place of testing, and any other related matter. Failure to comply will result in the student being subject to disciplinary action up to and including suspension from the University. For additional information concerning the Student Drug Testing Program, contact the Flight Department and/or Human Resources.

BOTTLE TO THROTTLE GUIDELINES FLIGHT OPERATIONS

ERAU FLIGHT OPERATIONS MANUAL AND U.S. FAR'S

- No person shall act or attempt to act as a crew member of an ERAU aircraft under the following conditions:
 - (i) Within 12 hours after the consumption of any alcoholic beverage;
 - (ii) While still under the influence of alcohol in any way;
 - (iii) While using any medicine or drug that affects your faculties in any way contrary to safety;
 - (iv) Received a DWI/DUI for driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and has not reported this fact to the Flight Training Department Chairman;
 - (v) Any association or use of narcotic drugs, marijuana, depressant or stimulant drugs, or any illegal substance as defined in Federal or State statute is strictly forbidden and will result in the immediate suspension and dismissal from the flight training program.
- No ERAU pilot will carry or allow to be carried aboard an ERAU aircraft any narcotic drug, marijuana, depressant, or stimulant drug, or controlled substances as defined in Federal or State statutes.
- Any ERAU pilot found operating an aircraft in violation of the above will be subject to dismissal from the University with possible further action conducted by the FAA for violation of FAR's (Ref. 14 CFR Part 91.17, 91.19).
 - (i) For the first offense, minimum automatic three month suspension from all flight training activities and denial of use of any aircraft;
 - (ii) For the second offense, minimum six month suspension from all flight training activities and denial of use of any aircraft;
 - (iii) For the third offense, permanent withdrawal from all flight training activities, permanent dismissal from the Aeronautical Science degree program and a recommendation for permanent dismissal from the University.

PROVISIONS OF FLORIDA

A person driving or in actual physical control of a vehicle is guilty of the offense of Driving Under the Influence (DUI) if such person is under the influence of alcoholic beverages, or any chemical or controlled substance set forth by law when:

- *Affected to the extent that normal faculties are impaired; or*
 - *The person has a blood or breath alcohol level of .08% or higher.*
- Employees who are not located in the State of Florida are encouraged to contact their local Police Department for the DUI laws for their state.

The following penalties apply upon conviction:

FOURTH/SUBSEQUENT CONVICTION(S)

- Punishable as a felony of the third degree.
- A minimum fine of \$1,000 will be imposed.
- License is permanently revoked.

DUI offenses which result in property damage, injury, or death to others are criminal offenses and are punishable as a misdemeanor of the 1st degree, a felony of the 3rd degree, and a felony of the 2nd degree, respectively.

Persons convicted of this statute with a blood/breath alcohol level of .20% or above, or who are accompanied by a minor at the time of the offense, shall be punished with an increased fine and imprisonment schedule.

Persons arrested may not be released from custody until he/she is no longer under the influence of alcoholic beverages, or chemical or controlled substances, as set forth by law, to the extent that his/her normal faculties are impaired, until blood alcohol level is less than .05%, or until 8 hours have elapsed since he/she was arrested.

Any person who accepts the privilege extended by law of operating a motor vehicle within the state of Florida shall, by operating a vehicle, be deemed to have given consent to submit to an approved chemical or physical test, if lawfully arrested for any DUI offense allegedly committed while driving or in physical control of a motor vehicle. Refusal will result in the suspension of the privilege to operate a motor vehicle for up to 12 months (18 months for subsequent refusals).

The number of convictions used in sentencing include previous convictions outside the state of Florida for DUI, Driving While Intoxicated (DWI), driving with an unlawful blood alcohol level, or any similar alcohol or drug related traffic offense.

The offender is responsible for all costs associated with his/her probation, vehicle impoundment, substance abuse course, substance abuse evaluation/treatment, and independent evaluations or chemical testing.

MANDATORY ADJUDICATION

No court may suspend, defer or withhold adjudication of guilt or imposition of any portion of a mandatory sentence. Revocation will be imposed by the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicle if the court does not stipulate revocation.

LIFETIME REVOCATION

No Florida drivers license may be issued, for life, after 4th conviction if at least one violation occurred after July 1, 1992; but offender may petition for license after 10 years.

ADMINISTRATIVE (ROAD SIDE) SUSPENSION

A person arrested for DUI with a blood alcohol level of .08% or higher, or who refuses breath, blood, or urine test requested by an officer, will have license confiscated and suspended immediately by the officer. The Officer will issue a 7 day temporary permit and suspension notice; the period of suspension will be 1 year, or 18 months if previously suspended for refusal of breath, blood, or urine test. If first offense for DUI, suspension will be for 6 months; for 2nd offense it will be for 1 year.

TEMPORARY BUSINESS OR EMPLOYMENT PERMIT

May not be issued until completion of substance abuse school with offender paying costs. No restricted license if prior conviction. Provisions apply if driver has actual physical control, even if parked or stopped.

GUIDELINES FOR USE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

It is an individual's right and choice to drink alcohol beverages within the parameters of state law and University policy. However, an individual who chooses to drink retains the responsibility for his/her behavior and conduct, both on and off campus. Disruptive or destructive behavior sometimes associated with, or as a consequence of, irresponsible drinking is not an acceptable form of conduct. A person found responsible for illegal use, misuse of alcohol, or inappropriate behavior associated with alcohol use will be subject to disciplinary action through the University Judicial System.

This is a partial list of guidelines for alcohol use on the Daytona Beach Campus. Additional information is available in the Student Activities Department.

- *All functions requesting the use of alcohol on campus must be scheduled through the Student Activities Office at least three weeks prior to the event.*
- *The University permits only beer and wine to be served, sold and/or consumed at campus events.*
- *At all functions where alcoholic beverages are present, alcohol should be considered a secondary activity and not as the sole purpose of the event.*
- *Only alcohol which is being served or sold at the event may be consumed at the event.*
- *Individuals may not bring alcoholic beverages to an event.*
- *Alternate nonalcoholic beverages and food must be made available whenever alcoholic beverages are served.*
- *Individuals selling, serving, in possession of, or consuming alcohol must be 21 years of age or older.*
- *Alcoholic beverages may be served, sold, or consumed at approved gatherings only.*
- *The Student Activities Department reserves the right to approve or disapprove alcohol at events on campus.*
- *Attendance at events where alcoholic beverages have been approved is limited to members of the campus community and their invited guests.*
- *The sponsoring organization of an event must appoint monitors to rove the event, the vicinity of the event, and insure that everyone consuming alcoholic beverages is properly identified (arm band, stamp, etc.).*

- *Anyone who appears to be intoxicated may be denied service of any additional alcoholic beverages.*
- *Alcoholic beverages are specifically prohibited at movie events.*
- *Glass bottles or containers are not permitted on University property.*
- *Anyone who is consuming or in the possession of alcoholic beverages is subject to being checked for appropriate identification as proof of legal drinking age.*

HELP AND RESOURCES

The Counseling Center provides substance abuse screening inventories and assessment in conjunction with the following support services. Students with issues of substance misuse will be offered supportive counseling services and referred to the campus "Prime for Life" program. Students with issues of substance dependence will be referred to addictions specialists in the Daytona Beach community.

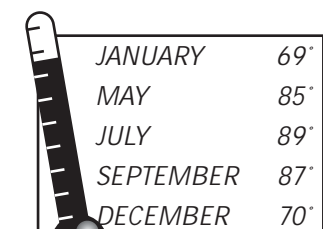
THE COMMUNITY & THE AREA

Daytona Beach has something for everyone. It offers the adventure of a big city with the warmth, charm and friendly atmosphere of a small town. Long known as one of Florida's primary tourist attractions, Daytona Beach is located on the central East Coast of Florida, in addition to the 23 miles of the "World's Most Famous Beach". The area is surrounded by lakes, rivers, and the ocean, providing an endless variety of recreational activities. Fresh and saltwater fishing are popular activities. Sport fishing tournaments are held in April, May and September. Sailing, surfing, snorkeling and swimming are other favorite water sports.

During the winter, you can always head for one of the nearby springs. The temperature of the springs stays in the low 70s all year round. Swimmers and snorkelers can spend their time shoulder-to-shoulder with the Bluegills, the Talapia, and the Manatees who swim up the St. John's River every winter. The springs, which are fed with a flow of millions of gallons of water a day, also offer some of the best inner tubing in the area.

If you like to camp or backpack, you'll enjoy the 362,000 acre Ocala National Forest and the 836 acre Tomoka State Park. Take a trail close to the Tomoka River and you'll be in Tarzan country, where alligators live in the marshlands and ospreys nest in the tops of the cypress trees. Along the winding black water of the Tomoka are stately live oak trees, with branches 70 feet long. Timber from these trees was used to build ships in the 19th century.

Winters are mild and summers are warm thanks to Daytona Beach's location on the Atlantic Ocean and the Halifax River, which flows between the peninsula and the mainland. The area's average temperature year-round is 70.5 degrees. Average monthly temperatures are:



Water temperatures range from the low 60s in winter and early spring to high 70s and low 80s from late spring through late fall.

Daytona Beach is a great place to visit. Tourism has been a major factor in the Daytona Beach area since the early 1900s. World-famous beaches are complemented by a strong industrial economy.

ARTS
